## Students join Japanese tour

A GROUP of visiting Japanese chefs, restaurateurs and managers arrived in Harvey recently for a tour of the Harvey Beef abattoir and facilities.

Nearly 70 per cent of Harvey Beef's output is exported with Japan being a major destination.

Many of the Japanese guests were from a casual dining chain called Kichiri, which has more than 60 restaurants throughout Japan.

It was revealed that roast beef is a favourite dish with Japanese diners.

Not only was the visit great for the local business, but it also proved an excellent opportunity for several Harvey Senior High School Japanese language and culture students to welcome them and practise Japanese conversation.

Japanese teacher Colin Newton and students Caitlin Puzey and Kiera Smith greeted the guests and accompanied them on a tour of the facilities where they viewed the processing techniques and quality assurance systems at the plant.

The visitors were also presented with souvenirs from the Harvey Visitors Centre and products from Harvey Fresh.

Harvey Beef administration services manager Rick Simpson has been working with the school as part of the national Asia Literacy Ambassadors program.

This national scheme aims to create links between skilled "Asia literate" professionals and secondary schools to encourage further studies of Asian languages and culture and provide opportunities for students to develop their own abilities and confidence.

The school, a recipient of a Federal Government grant to develop its Japanese language program, has been recognised for the work it is doing to ensure students develop the language, business and cultural skills required to thrive in what is touted to be an Asia-dominant 21st century.

WATER levels at Logue Brook Dam are not yet sufficient for recreational water sport activities and the popular spot is still closed for boating and water skiing.

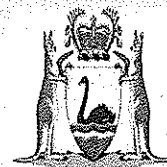
A Water Corporation spokesperson said more rainfall was needed to bring water levels up to make boating and water skiing safe.

Thanks to funding received from the State NRM Program, Landcare SJ Inc. baiting season.

To be eligible you **MUST MEET THE FOLLOWING CRITERIA:**

- Own or lease property in the Shires of Serpentine Jarrahdale, Murray, War
  - Be outside of a gazetted town site;
  - Have a rural property in excess of 5 hectares (smaller properties are eligibl
  - Inform in writing **ALL** adjoining properties of the time and place of baiting (
  - Display appropriate warning signs (also provided);
  - Be accredited to use 1080 or obtain accreditation by reading "Landholder T
- completing a simple multiple choice questionnaire assessed by a Biosecurity

Applications for baiting need to be submitted by Friday 4<sup>th</sup> November 2011
